Congratulations to Dr. Stanley Andrisse for being featured in *Nature* . https://www.nature.com/articles/d41586-019-03370-1 and being the co-recipient of a \$7.4 million dollar NSF grant to increase access to STEM education for currently and formerly incarcerated people.



Stanley Andrisse, Ph.D., MBA Assistant Professor Department of Physiology & Biophysics

An excerpt from his Nature article:

"I completed a master's in business administration and a Ph.D. focused on diabetes and physiology. I did it in four years, and finished at the top of my class. Because I am black and have been in prison, I thought I had to be four times as good as anyone else. When applying for postdocs, I was fortunate enough to find out that Johns Hopkins University had 'banned the box' — they didn't include a check box for criminal convictions. Hopkins is Maryland's leading hirer of formerly incarcerated people. I did two years of a postdoc at Johns Hopkins before transitioning into a faculty role there. I'm now in a tenure-track position at Howard University in Washington DC.

We are in a state of mass incarceration in the United States, the country with the highest incarceration rate in the world. Roughly 70 million Americans — almost one-third of the working population — have a criminal record. Around 25% of formerly incarcerated people do not have a high-school diploma or equivalent graduation certificate. Knowing how transformational education can be, I started From Prison Cells to PhD, a non-profit organization that currently works with 100 formerly incarcerated people each year. We provide resources, tools, support, mentoring and internships to help them to pursue their academic goals. We also continue to push academic institutions to 'ban the box'. Our efforts helped to remove the criminal-history section from the Common Application, which is used by most US universities.

HARVARD MACY PROGRAM

Program for Educators in Health Professions Offered Annually in Boston, MA

The goal of the Harvard Macy Institute Program for Educators in Health Professions is to enhance the professional development of physicians, basic scientists, and other healthcare professionals as educators. The program is built around 7 major themes: the science of learning, teaching skills & strategies, inquiry and evidence in education, curriculum design, examining your assumptions, leadership development, and innovations in education.

The program consists of **two sessions in residence at Harvard**: a 6-day spring session and a 6-day fall session. Learning formats include large group presentations; interactive exercises; case-method teaching; problem-based learning; observations; reflective use of journals; and discussions in large and small groups. A variety of faculty facilitated small group formats are used to support learning from observations, to draw together scholars with common interests, and to further the development of each scholar's back home project for educational change.

HUCOM has funding for two faculty members to attend this program with a priority given to projects that have a focus on improving medical student education. In order to receive funding, we ask that you submit your proposal to swati.goel@howard.edu no later than December 1, 2019. The committee of the Office of Faculty Development will review all received proposals and determine which will be funded. Our office can also put you in touch with previous Harvard Macy scholars from the COM who can assist you with proposal development and be a valuable resource. If you submit directly to the Harvard Macy program without first reaching out to the Office of Faculty Development, we will not be able to assist you with funding.
