

Evaristus Nwulia, MD, MHS: Principal Investigator (Contact PI)

Dr. Evaristus Nwulia is a MD, MHS clinical and olfactory neuroscientist who is one of the Principal Investigators and serves as the contact PI of the proposed study. Dr. Nwulia is a Professor of Psychiatry and the Director of the Translational Neuroscience Laboratory at Howard University. He is a clinical olfactory neuroscientist who pioneered the platform combining laser-capture microscopy and RT-PCR to study molecular mechanisms of state changes in olfactory neurons derived from living subjects through nasal biopsy. He publishes on molecular, psychophysics and neural mechanisms in the olfactory pathways. His primary responsibility is to oversee the overall diagnostic, technical and logistic responsibilities for the project. He shares responsibility to the design of the study as well as any modification to the study. He is responsible for organizing all key personnel/consultants. Dr. Nwulia's

experience as lead PI in NIH- and foundation-funded grants, his trainings in clinical psychiatry, genetics, basic neuroscience, and epidemiology, biostatistics and Biocomputing make him suitable to lead the MPI grant.



Magdalena Misiak PhD Principal Investigator

Dr. Misiak is a highly experienced neuroscientist experienced in neurodegeneration with focus on neurogenesis, olfaction, DNA repair and mitochondria to nucleus cross-talk. She received extensive training in neurobiology of aging for over 5 years at the NIH/NIA, where she notably investigated DNA repair moderation of AD using animal models of AD and DNA base-excision repair (e.g. DNA Polymerase Beta) enzymes. She is invested in developing animal and cellular models of olfactory aging and specializes on gene perturbations, mitochondrial biology and olfactory pathogenesis. She will lead all cell culture and molecular studies at HU. She will be involved in samples management and processing, nucleic acids and proteins extraction and preparation for RNA-based epigenomic experiments, oxidative stress.

Thomas Obisesan, MD Principal Investigator

Dr. Thomas Obisesan is a MD geriatrician who is Professor and Chief of the Division of Geriatrics at Howard University. He is a nationally-acclaimed expert in Alzheimer's disease and a member of the Alzheimer's Disease Cooperative Study (ADCS), Alzheimer's Disease Neuroimaging Initiatives (ADNI) Steering Committees. He has received numerous grants and awards from the NIA, Alzheimer's Association, as well as many industry funded AD therapeutics, from Phase I to Phase III. As PI he will bring his meaningful wealth of experience in clinical and cognitive aspects of this research. His primary responsibility is to provide expertise in this neurodegenerative disease of Alzheimer's and take part in finding ways to prevent this disease.

HARVARD MACY PROGRAM

Program for Educators in Health Professions Offered Annually in Boston, MA

The goal of the Harvard Macy Institute Program for Educators in Health Professions is to enhance the professional development of physicians, basic scientists, and other healthcare professionals as educators. The program is built around 7 major themes: the science of learning, teaching skills & strategies, inquiry and evidence in education, curriculum design, examining your assumptions, leadership development, and innovations in education.

The program consists of two sessions in residence at Harvard: a 6-day spring session and a 6-day fall session. Learning formats include large group presentations; interactive exercises; case-method teaching; problem-based learning; observations; reflective use of journals; and discussions in large and small groups. A variety of faculty facilitated small group formats are used to support learning from observations, to draw together scholars with common interests, and to further the development of each scholar's back home project for educational change.

HUCOM has funding for two faculty members to attend this program with a priority given to projects that have a focus on improving medical student education. In order to receive funding, we ask that you submit your proposal to swati.goel@howard.edu no later than November 11, 2019. The committee of the Office of Faculty Development will review all received proposals and determine which will be funded. Our office can also put you in touch with previous Harvard Macy scholars from the COM who can assist you with proposal development and be a valuable resource. If you submit directly to the Harvard Macy program without first reaching out to the Office of Faculty Development, we will not be able to assist you with funding.

Purpose

The NEGEA supports and encourages innovation in medical education. To recognize faculty members in NEGEA-affiliated schools who have developed an innovative approach to medical education, the NEGEA will provide one award of \$3,000 to recognize an outstanding innovation in medical education. This is an award rather than a grant and, as such, the winner has the discretion on how the funds are applied for continued improvement in medical education.

Eligibility

All faculty members in NEGEA-affiliated schools may submit a proposal. Faculty members may submit only one project and may not be an author on any other project currently receiving NEGEA funding.

Effective classroom management is much more than simply administering corrective measures when a student misbehaves; it's about developing proactive ways to prevent problems from occurring in the first place while creating a positive learning environment. Establishing a climate for learning is one of the most challenging aspects of teaching, and one of the most difficult skills to master, even at the post-secondary level.
