Congratulation to Celia J. Maxwell, M.D., FACP, FIDSA, on her published book chapter in *Global Health and Volunteering Beyond Borders: A Guide for Healthcare Professionals.* The chapter is titled – "Perspectives on Global Health and Volunteerism for Healthcare Providers: The Importance of Preparation, Identification, and Management of Infectious Diseases and Mitigation of Other Risks."

Dr. Maxwell serves as the Associate Dean for Research at Howard University College of Medicine. She is currently the Principal Investigator of several prestigious projects. They include: The Center for Infectious Disease Management and Research's, Ryan White EIS program, The DC DOH Routine

HIV Testing Program and as Co-PI for the PEPFAR funded HBCU Clinical Practice Transformation Project in Zambia.

Dr. Maxwell obtained a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Hunter College and her medical degree from Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, both in New York City. She completed her residency training in Internal Medicine at Howard University Hospital and a Fellowship in Parasitology at the National Institutes of Health, Laboratory of Parasitic Diseases. Her research interests then involved the investigation of the immune response of humans to the hookworm parasite. Dr. Maxwell is an Associate Professor of Medicine in the Department of Medicine Division of Infectious Diseases. She is board certified in Internal Medicine and Infectious Diseases, and is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians and the Infectious Diseases Society of America, as well as a member of several boards and scientific associations. To date she has conducted international medical site visits or served as a lecturer in Cuba, Haiti, Panama, Dubai UAE, Uganda, Zambia, Senegal, Beijing, India and Brazil.



Congratulations to **Shaolin Liu, Ph.D. and the Department of Anatomy**, for receiving an NIH one-year grant totaling \$261,882 for lab work entitled "Mechanisms underlying APOE-4 effects on olfactory bulb circuits." Dr. Liu is an Assistant Professor and PI at Howard University College of Medicine in the Department of Anatomy.

Dr. Liu's current research focuses on how sensory information is processed at the cellular and circuit levels with a model of the mouse olfactory system, a highly conservative sensory modality with output directly to the limbic system and heavy involvement in emotion, learning and memory in humans.

Specifically, present research addresses fundamental questions on the anatomical and functional organization of neural pathways in the olfactory systems by capitalizing on cutting-edge technologies, including cell type-specific opto- and chemo-genetics combined with *in vitro* and *in vivo* electrophysiology, in vivo calcium imaging, immunohistochemistry, confocal imaging as well as behavioral approaches. Our work is presently supported by federal fund from NIH and has led to important findings published in high-profile peer-reviewed journals.

HARVARD MACY PROGRAM

Program for Educators in Health Professions Offered Annually in Boston, MA

The goal of the Harvard Macy Institute Program for Educators in Health Professions is to enhance the professional development of physicians, basic scientists, and other healthcare professionals as educators. The program is built around 7 major themes: the science of learning, teaching skills & strategies, inquiry and evidence in education, curriculum design, examining your assumptions, leadership development, and innovations in education.

The program consists of **two sessions in residence at Harvard**: a 6-day spring session and a 6-day fall session. Learning formats include large group presentations; interactive exercises; case-method teaching; problem-based learning; observations; reflective use of journals; and discussions in large and small groups. A variety of faculty facilitated small group formats are used to support learning from observations, to draw together scholars with common interests, and to further the development of each scholar's back home project for educational change.

HUCOM has funding for two faculty members to attend this program with a priority given to projects that have a focus on improving medical student education. In order to receive funding, we ask that you submit your proposal to swati.goel@howard.edu no later than Oct 31st, 2019. The committee of the Office of Faculty Development will review all received proposals and determine which will be funded. Our office can also put you in touch with previous Harvard Macy scholars from the COM who can assist you with proposal development and be a valuable resource. If you submit directly to the Harvard Macy program without first reaching out to the Office of Faculty Development, we will not be able to assist you with funding.


