**** DC CME Requirements for Physicians – DC Health Board of Medicine - <https://dchealth.dc.gov/node/120612> ****

2018 is a renewal year for all licensees of the Board of Medicine. As part of the renewal process, licensees will need to complete the required number of continuing education (CE) credits for their profession prior to Dec 31st 2018. Below is a list of the current CE requirements: Physicians (MD/DO) - Fifty (50) hours of CE every two (2) years, which includes **three (3) hours in the subject of HIV/AIDS, two (2) hours in the subject of LGBTQ cultural competency, and at least one (1) course in the subject of pharmacology.**

1. DC Board of Medicine is providing free courses available to licensees to acquire the necessary hours in the subject of LGBTQ: National LGBT Health Education Center - A Program of the Fenway Institute: <https://www.lgbthealtheducation.org/lgbt-education/cme/>
Sign up for free registration using HEI Facility ID **57913** (Howard University Hospital, Washington DC) **Please note that even though the webinars are free not all provide CME.** Select appropriately to obtain the required number of CME credits.

The Office of Faculty Development, in conjunction with the MidAtlantic AETC Howard University Regional Site and the National Black Justice Coalition, will be offering free workshops on site over the next few months to assist HUCOM physicians to achieve the CME requirements needed for credentialing. Harvard Macy Program for Educators in Health Professions Residential Program offered annually in Boston, MA

Please note that the Office of Faculty Development is excited to continue to offer this professional development program for the coming academic year. As part of a Kaiser Permanente Faculty development award, we are able to send **2 faculty members annually** to the Harvard Macy Institute residential program for educators in health professions. This is solely a residential program and our funding will cover the program, housing and transportation costs as well as meals. As part of the formal application to the program the applicant must submit a project proposal. Some examples of projects are: designing and teaching a new or revised course/clerkship or residency rotation; creating a faculty development program; introducing or enhancing professional rewards for healthcare educators; integrating technological advances with curriculum design. Of note we are asking Chairs and/or other senior leadership to identify faculty in your departments who will be change agents for the institution and encourage them to submit their names to the Office of Faculty Development as soon as possible to be eligible for this training and funding. The faculty member if successfully accepted into the program, will need to be relieved of all other duties during the residential portion of the program (16 days in total) and may require some additional protected time to develop their projects. The goal of the faculty development office, in conjunction with the medical school leadership, is to develop as cadre of Harvard Macy trained "Master educators" who will move forward our educational mission.

OVERVIEW

The goal of the Harvard Macy Institute Program for Educators in Health Professions is to enhance the professional development of physicians, basic scientists, and other healthcare professionals as educators. The program is built around 6 major themes: the science of learning, teaching skills and strategies, inquiry and evidence in education, curriculum design, leadership development, and innovations in education. The program consists of two sessions in residence at Harvard: a 10-day winter session and a 6-day spring session. Learning formats include large group presentations; interactive exercises; case method teaching; problem-based learning; observations; reflective use of journals; and discussions in large and small groups. A variety of faculty-facilitated small group formats are used to support learning from observations, to draw together scholars with common interests, and to further the development of each scholar's back-home project for educational change.
